





Health and Safety Protocols 2021-2022

1

Masks Optional

At SMSA, we believe parents/guardians know what is best for their individual child's well-being. Masks will be optional for the academic year and we prayerfully ask that you, parents/guardians, remain socially responsible. If your child(ren) is exhibiting symptoms of any illness, keep them at home until symptoms subside and they are fever free for 24 hours.

Contact Tracing

Students will be quarantined if they, or household members, have tested positive for COVID-19. Families with students in close contact with anyone testing positive on campus will receive an exposure letter (similar to a lice exposure). The family will then decide what option is best for their child(ren) (i.e., test, quarantine or return to school).

Quarantine Household Contact

If a member of your household has tested positive for COVID-19, please alert SMSA, (smsacademy.org/reportcovid), stay home and follow the Fond du Lac County Health Department's guidelines for return to school.

Isolate Non-Household Close Contact

(symptomatic)

If your child(ren) are showing symptoms of COVID-19, please keep your child(ren) home until fever free for 24 hours. COVID-19 testing is recommended, but not required, before returning to school.

Quarantine Non-Household Close Contact

(asymptomatic)

If your child(ren) was exposed to someone who tested positive for COVID-19 outside the home and school, please notify SMSA (smsacademy.org/reportcovid), monitor for symptoms and keep your child(ren) home if they are exhibiting any symptoms.



Additional steps being implemented to ensure a safe and healthy academic year:

enhanced facility cleaning, water fill stations to re-fill water bottles, masks/face shields available to students, full-time System-wide Coordinator of Health Services, internal tracking and tracing protocols monitoring for increased spread/in-school transmission, hand sanitizing stations, fostering a mask/non-mask and vaccinated/non-vaccinated inclusive environment and further protocols should transmission become persistent.

Considerations for Returning to School 2021-2022



Supporting Data:

- Children between 1-18 years of age have lower rates of hospitalization, severe hospitalization and deaths than do other age groups
 - Severe/critical illness and death are rare and occur most commonly in children with underlying health conditions
- SARS-CoV-2 appears to act differently in children and adolescents than other common respiratory viruses, such as influenza
- Children and adolescents play a major role in amplifying influenza outbreaks, to date, this does not appear to be the case with SARS-CoV-2
- Evidence indicates that children and adolescents can become infected and are less likely to be symptomatic and less likely to have severe disease resulting from SARS-CoV-2
- COVID-19 polices are intended to mitigate, not eliminate, risk
 - Implementation of several coordinated interventions can greatly reduce that risk

Definitions:

- Quarantine
 - for exposed, unvaccinated individuals to stay home and away from all people and activities such as: school, work, sports, parties, events, etc.
- Isolate
 - for sick individuals to stay home and away from all people and activities such as: school, work, sports, parties, events, etc.
- Close Contact
 - an exposed individual to a confirmed or probable case, masked or unmasked, within 6 feet for 15 minutes or more, cumulative
- Cohort
 - to group students into smaller pods, so that you limit the amount of possible exposure
- Asymptomatic
 - showing no signs or symptoms of illness
