Who won field day in 2019?



War in the Middle East

17 of the Israel-Hamas war, at which time at least 1,400 people had been killed in Israel. According to the Palestinian Ministry of Health, over 5,080 people have been killed in Gaza after Hamas launched attacks on Israel early in October. The Israel-Palestine conflict, a long-standing and deeply complex issue, has once again captured global attention due to recent events.

The Israel-Palestine conflict is a dispute that has been at the center of attention in the Middle East for over a century.

This struggle is rooted in



complex historical events,
nationalist movements, and
competing national aspirations.
These conflicts are among Jewish
Israelis and Palestinian Arabs. To

grasp the current state of the conflict and the challenges, it is essential to know some of their history.

In the late 19th century, nationalist movements gained momentum within both the Jewish and Arab communities residing in Palestine, part of the former Ottoman Empire. This period saw a significant influx of immigrants religious and political motives and the Balfour Declaration in 1917 by the British government. declaration This expressed support for the establishment of a "national home for the Jewish people" in Palestine. After World War II, the United Nations proposed a partition plan in 1947, which recommended dividing Palestine into separate Jewish and Arab states and designating Jerusalem as an international city.

Jewish leaders accepted this plan, but it was rejected by Arab states. This disagreement



in 1948, a conflict resulting in the establishment of the State of Israel and the displacement of hundreds of thousands of Palestinians. Israel took control of the land that many Palestinians called home. The only land left was the Gaza Strip, held by Egypt, and the West Bank, controlled by Jordan.

Then in 1967, the Six-Day War marked a pivotal event in the Israel-Palestine conflict. Facing perceived threats from neighboring Arab states, Israel launched a defensive strike that led to the capture of the West Bank, Gaza Strip, East Jerusalem, and Golan the Heights. The status of these territories remains a significant

issue and has been an ongoing and underlying cause for constant tensions.

On October 7, 2023, Hamas launched a surprise attack on Israel, launching thousands of rockets into Israel and infiltrating the country by air, sea and land. Sparking fear and killing many, the war officially began. Israel has responded with a barrage of airstrikes that have decimated the Gaza Strip, leaving more than 350,000 residents displaced and without resources needed to survive. While there is no simple resolution, staying aware and educated is vital as these tensions continue to rise and more innocent lives are taken.
